I am needing a new home because I suffer from separation anxiety and unfortunately my owner had to work long hours so I was being left alone a lot. I am OK with other dogs once I have been introduced but can be anxious at first. I have lived with children but I prefer ones who will not jump on me or make me over excited. Ideally I would love a new home where I would not be



left alone or where I can travel with my new owner.



Hello my name is <u>China</u>. I'm 2½ years old and I live with my friend <u>Socks</u>. He's 3; he's very shy so I'm writing for us both (the big wimp)! Let me tell you a little about Socks first; Socks is a typical boy (he says shy, I say lazy). He sits in his basket until the humans here at Windyway bring our food, then he cant wait to come out! He doesn't mind them putting their hands in to his basket to stroke him and if you're lucky enough to see him out you can pick him up but he is very reluctant to show his face unless there's food

around. I don't know why because he's a handsome chap! I however (China) will sit and show off my beautiful blue eyes all day long and apparently I'm cross eyed! Cool right? I'm told this doesn't affect my eyesight so I've really embraced it. I'm like a kitten; I run around jumping in boxes, batting around my toys and I love climbing my cat tree! I love being stroked and will rub myself all over you. However I do get a little nervous when they pick me up. Socks and I are both sociable with other cats and dogs too, I hope Socks becomes a little less shy because we'd make lovely pets for an understanding family with older children. My name is **Ralph** and I think I'm almost 2 years old. I'm more like a dog than a cat; once I get



to know you I will follow you absolutely everywhere! I don't mind being picked up but I'm not really a 'cuddly' cat. Having said that you can stroke me all day long and i have a super loud purr. I really, really love my food! I'm on a grain free diet because my skin can get a little sore from time to time but I'm a good boy when the vet has to check me over!

Unfortunately I have FIV which means I can't go outside or with other kitties although other cats don't bother me. I would require plenty of space to stretch my long legs. I have a cat tree at Windyway and I love to climb to the top to survey my land! I'm not very good with small children; bit too much noise for me so an adult only household would be ideal.

Khia is a very special older lady who came to us unable to bear weight on her back legs. She had to be lifted into the car and provided with lots of soft padding to prevent sores. After being checked thoroughly by our vets she was diagnosed with severe arthritis in her hips, one ruptured cruciate ligament, spondylosis in several vertebrae and a medium—severe heart condition. She was immediately put on painkillers and heart medication and following weeks of kennel rest and careful rehabilitation she is now able to manage several short walks per day and is moving in to a temporary foster home for the next phase of her rehab. She is an

amazing dog who doesn't let her disabilities get in the way of exploring every soft toy, every interesting smell or pile of leaves. Her nose is always on the ground and her tail is always wagging. She has so much enthusiasm that we are hopeful that she will go on to live a happy life for as long as possible. She loves everyone and everything except for cats which she wants to chase. The main problem anyone will have will be making sure she doesn't overdo it and injure herself again. She will always need painkillers and heart medication as well as

regular check-ups with the vet. Full adoption or permanent foster will both be considered for this beautiful girl but we would prefer her to stay local to Macclesfield/ Bollington so that we can continue to support and monitor her care.

Also seeking adoption or foster care is **Daisy**, a 4 year old Bulldog. We would love her to find a permanent new home, but she has quite a few health problems which are associated with her breed (skin and eye problems), so is on a lot of medication. This would be a lot for someone to take on, so we are looking for a foster home for her for now. She loves company and cuddles and is getting fed up in the kennels. She is good with cats and dogs but needs an adult only home with someone who is around at home a lot and who will be able to cope with administering her long list of eye and skin treatments.

She's not keen on long walks but does love to go for rides in the car.

Lucy and Tom are mother and son and are best friends. They are both 6 years old. They are quite shy when they meet new people but if you spend some time with them they soon make friends with you. They must stay together and would love a home where they have plenty of space to hop around and explore.

STATISTICS

We now have computer software making it possible to share some numbers which some of you might find interesting... (as we get to grips with the software the numbers will be more accurate as certain selections have to be made in order for them to be categorised correctly). Between 1.12.16 and 1.12.17 we took in 316 animals and 13 kittens were born here. 319 animals have been rehomed, 23 returned from homes, 23 found animals have been reunited with owners and 10, sadly, have had to be put to sleep.
